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The Garden of Owls

We bought a part ruined farmhouse in France and discovered a pair of Barn-owls nesting in the barn and a couple of Kestrels with a nest in a hole in the main-wall of the house. But once all was restored and we moved in permanently, sadly, the Kestrels and Barn-owls moved out.

We felt very guilty and wanted to provide them with some alternative so we installed a Barnowl nest-box in the new barn and a kestrel nest-box against the side of the house.

Though Kestrels and Barn-owls still hunted around our house, it took several years before we heard sounds from the barn-owl nest-box and discovered 5 chicks inside.

We installed a fantastic invention in the nest box, an infra-red camera, and now follow the family on our TV screen. This private owlpeepshow every evening gives us much pleasure. We track them from mating, laying, feeding; also the dramas like the cannibalism and puberty. The young owls are not always kind to each other - the largest beak gets the most food.

For six years the birds have returned to breed. By researching the many pellets in and around the nest-box, we found that our Barn-owls main food is mice, shrews, voles and occasionally loirs or small birds. We still collect the pellets which are welcomed by schools for biology lessons.

In "good" mice-years, the owls have between five to eight young, but in "poor" mice-years, just two or three chicks. We do help them by trapping mice all winter, keeping them in the freezer, and when we notice poor feeding by the parents, we give the chicks surplus-food.



Many of our bird-loving friends (and their cats) help as well. The late Rosemary Latham's cat was the champion. Almost all birds of prey and owls start breeding on the first laid egg. Two days or more later, they lay a second egg and so on. For Barn-owls with perhaps 8 eggs, the difference between the first and last born chick might be 16 days or more. If there's insufficient food, the older chicks eat the younger. Survival of the fittest.

Until 2018, the kestrel-nest box remained empty. Then suddenly, the camera showed us Scops-owls (they normally nest in hollow trees or cliffs) with their four grasshopper-fed chicks. The following year, there were four more baby Scops-owls.

When we switched on the infra-red camera in 2020, the occupant looked to us like a huge Scops-owl. It was, in fact, a Tawny owl with two eggs and 6 weeks later, two young Tawny-owls flew the nest. On their menu: mice, loirs, a black rat and a very small rabbit.

When the Scops-owls returned from Africa, they found their nest-box occupied and although they stayed around all summer, they ignored the new nest box I'd made for them and they left without nesting. Lack of big grasshoppers perhaps?

It's December now and the Tawny-owls hunt every night around our house and sing their beautiful oehoehoehoe . The Barn-owls are rather silent, they just give a raucous "siss" when they hunt.


They are all more than welcome, being our only visitors in this Corona-period.
